Course name: Independent Study – Continuing Swedish Abroad

Course Description

This highly conversational course allows intermediate and advanced level students of Swedish to continue their studies by immersing themselves in the language in Sweden. The focus will be on developing fluency in speaking and writing as well as furthering the understanding of Swedish culture. Building on existing skills, we will take advantage of being in-country and utilize authentic materials (popular literature, media, information pamphlets, etc.) and combine it with hands-on experiential learning activities, such as role-plays, interviews and out-of-classroom activities. This course will not replace any higher-level Swedish (3-8) taught at Pitt.

Learning Objectives

By the end of the course, students will have:

- have had ample opportunities to immerse themselves in Swedish and Swedish culture and improved on their socio-cultural competency
- developed a greater competence in comprehending and producing the language, both spoken and written
- gained knowledge about Swedish, and specifically, Uppsala student life through the learning of culture-specific vocabulary

Course Prerequisites

At least 2 semesters of Swedish at Pitt OR placement test before arrival in-country to determine appropriate level of language instruction.

Methods of Instruction

The course will be highly conversational and students need to come to class prepared to use their Swedish. Classroom sessions will typically involve discussions of a popular novel read together, news, TV-shows, or situational activities designed to teach a specific set of vocabulary or phrases, e.g. going to the doctor, applying for a job, etc. Students will be highly involved in choosing articles, blogs, shows, etc. to use as basis for discussions and students will take turns introducing materials. Grammar will be taught/reviewed as needed and in connection with class discussions. Classroom sessions will be followed with experiential learning session, where students get to practice the vocabulary, pronunciation and grammar from the classroom sessions. Students will interview Swedes, visit restaurants, cafés and supermarkets, go to the nations, etc. and be expected to conduct these visits using only Swedish. In addition, students will be paired up with language partners and meet with them once a week to practice the language in an informal setting.

Assessment and Final Grade

Grading will be based on the following:

1. Attendance and Participation: 50 %

2. Homework and quizzes: 25 %

3. Final Written Exam: 10 %

4. Final Oral Exam: 15 %

Course Requirements

Attendance and class participation

Since this course heavily focuses on improving conversational skills, attendance and class participation are the most important part of the course, and these categories will make up for 50 % of the final grade. Should students fail to attend or not to actively participate in the experiential learning activities, the grade will be heavily affected.

Homework

Students are expected to complete homework assignments on their own and occasionally with a partner. Students will also take turns presenting interesting materials to be used as basis for discussions, e.g. news, songs, blogs, etc. they encounter while in Uppsala. Since the students have expressed an interest in reading and using a Swedish novel as basis for discussion, they will be expected to come in prepared to discuss the assigned reading for that day. Students will also be required to take 3 quizzes to show they have learned their homework. Homework assignments and quizzes count for 25 % of the final grade.

Exams

At the end of the course, there will be a final exam which counts for 10 % of the final grade. The exam will focus on the theoretical parts of the course (grammar and vocabulary). There will also be an oral exam counting for 15 % of the final grade.
